
And we have come to value this pattern—as in these times of worship, prayer, fellowship, and business we are renewed and strengthened in our own faith and ministry.

Superintendent's Report

James R. Braddy



Two thousand and ten is now safely tucked away in the pages of history. I am reminded of a saying from years ago, "Only one life will soon be past, only what's done for Christ will last!" Many "lasting" things were accomplished in and through the District this past year. This report will attempt to recap the highlights.

Two important components for the future really came into place this year. Robert Douglas completed the first two-year phase of the Cohort Ministry. Fifty churches participated as Cohorts provided training and tools for pastors to grow their ministries. Church planting is ramping up under the leadership of Scott Hagan. The District hosted it's first "Boot Camp" or church planters training in September. This next decade should see NCN launching many new churches to reach the growing population of Northern California and Nevada. With nearly thirteen million people living in our District we must continue to grow strong and healthy churches and plant new churches to meet the needs of an expanding population.

World Missions continues to be at the heart of our reason for existence! One of the core values of this District is missions. Again, in spite of a challenging economy, you have managed to support missions in an outstanding way. In 2010 you gave to help purchase needed medical equipment for Vietnam through Assist International. Projects through Speed the Light and Women's Ministry were funded. This District has placed 128 World Missionaries on the field in 47 countries.

We acknowledge our newest appointed missionaries, Shannell Keck and David Cartwright. These friends are now raising their support so they can be your representatives in Taiwan and Costa Rica respectively. At the time of the writing of this report, the final figures were not available for our missions giving. However, it is safe to say

that, even in a disastrous economic year for many, over \$8 million was contributed to reach our nation and world. A full report will be available by District Council time.

Judi and I traveled in May to Spain to be with missionaries Scott and Marisa Smith. Their work in church planting and Bible school training is impacting that country in a significant way. Through the wonderful work of Stan and Julie Wagner 28 churches and 80 members participated in five trips to help build churches and Bible schools around the world. Giving and going drives us in reaching our world.

Prayer for the persecuted church hit home in 2010. Many of our folk in certain parts of the world were expelled, harassed, and singled for scrutiny by governments for their work in

humanitarian ways. The Aldrich's and Henslee's had to flee Haiti due to civil unrest. Your prayer support is essential for these caring and committed workers.

Someone has asked me, "What does a Superintendent do?" Well, let me give you a quick glimpse into the world of a Superintendent:

Presbytery: I conducted four District Presbytery meetings, nine Executive Presbytery meetings, and twelve Executive Committee meetings.

Bethany: In 2010 I conducted four Executive Committee meetings, three Bethany Board meetings, attended Baccalaureate and Graduation, plus numerous other meetings with the President.

General Council: I served on two committees, one board, attended the General Presbytery, AGWM Missionary Renewal, Southwest Superintendents Conference, and Executive Leadership Conference.

CEP: I also serve on the Church Extension Plan Board and Executive Committee.

Local: It was my privilege to speak in twenty-nine churches, conduct several installations, meet with ten church boards, visit fourteen sections, two Teen Challenge functions, one regional Chi Alpha gathering, Minister's Renewal, conducted or participated in several funerals, retreats, Mt. Lassen camp, and many, many office appointments here at the DRC. This meant I traveled nearly 28,000 miles by car and many more miles by airplane. Whew!

Through it all I felt humbled to be reelected to serve you, the pastors, ministers, and the churches of Northern California and Nevada Assemblies of God. I would not want to be a part of any other District. You are the best!

The guiding factor of this District's ministry remains the Core Values. We are about:

Mission
Fellowship
Service
Leadership

All we do flows from those four core values. The ministries we provide and the service we offer are all connected to those values.

The budget cuts we had to make affected our departmental ministries. Every director and coordinator, with the exception of Student Ministries, was reduced to part time. The position of Girls Ministries Coordinator was folded into Children's Ministries, Director Nikki Rogers' position, to further balance the budget for 2011. Heartfelt thanks to Kelly Einsel who served in this capacity for four years. We will continue to monitor the CMF funds to insure that all operate in the black.



Secretary-Treasurer's Report

Dr. Jay A. Herndon



We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers, remembering without ceasing your work of faith, labor of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ in the sight of our God and Father, knowing, beloved brethren, your election by God. (1 Thessalonians 1:2-4)

People sometimes think of “the District” as an office in Sacramento, or a small group of leaders. But the reality is that “the District” isn’t in one location, but in every location; it isn’t three of us, but it is all of us. WE are “the District.” It’s important to keep that in mind all of the time but especially as I make this report. It isn’t MY report, but it is OUR report! It is a compilation of our collaborative efforts. In the end, that’s what makes our District great—it is YOU that makes it great!

FINANCIAL REPORT

The Financial Report comes in two parts 1) The Audit Report and 2) The Budget Report. These two statements report on the financial status of the District from different perspectives. Both are important, but they differ from one another:

The **Budget Report** looks at the income and expense of the operating departments. This is a management tool—it watches closely those areas where there are lots of activities, but it does not look at some other things, like restricted accounts. It is mostly a cash-based report, although we do set aside a significant amount of “reserve funds for future needs” which are treated as current expenses (although we haven’t actually spent the money yet). The Budget Report is a tool that allows the management to get a quick handle on the most important numbers.

The **Audit Report** looks at the financial performance of the District Council Incorporated. This

is a legal report on everything that is legally a part of the “AGNCND, Inc.” This includes Restricted Accounts, Endowments, District Affiliated Church monies, and District Affiliated Church properties. This report is compiled by an outside auditor and is not completed until April. It will be distributed at District Council (not included here). The Audit is mostly an accrual based report and some transactions are treated differently than a budget report.

The Budget Report will show that we ended the year in the black (Praise God!).

General Fund: We’ve not asked for a Tithe Increase in the last two years and our tithe income was down 1.7% from 2009; nevertheless, we’ve managed to cut the budget and we ended in the black.

Church Ministries Division: Our CMF (Church Ministry Fund) giving was down 5% from 2009 and we adjusted our budgets accordingly. (We are no longer overly dependent on event income.) Some departments did end in the red, but most were in the black, and we were in the black overall.

I continue to work respectfully with our ministers to help them fulfill their obligation to tithe. I also continue to work with the churches to promote giving to the CMF Fund. We have seen a decline in the number of churches giving to CMF. The departmental ministries are very valuable to our District Affiliated churches; we really need greater participation in this area.

Leadership Development and Pastoral Care Division: This division ended in the red. The General Fund will cover the deficit this year.

District Churches and District Missions Division: This is mostly funded by Gararden Fund Endowment earnings. At the beginning of the year half of the Gararden monies were invested in mutual funds and half in fixed-income deposits. However, the Executive Presbytery has instructed that the mutual funds be liquidated, and that we invest these funds in local churches (small mortgage loans). To date we have approved five small loans to individual churches. The interest earning on these investments is higher than the savings rate. The DCDM Division ended the year with no deficit or surplus.

Endowment:

Despite the bad economy, our endowments are solid. Of the \$3,301,343 of endowment monies, we have only \$150K~invested in the public market. Overall, our endowments earned \$155,982 through investments, and we released \$163,206 for ministry.

As of December 31, 2010 the Endowment Fund Balances were:

- 1. AGUSM Missionaries: Schmidt Fund = \$369,928
- 2. AGUSM Missionaries: Johnson Fund = \$650,561
- 3. Return Fare for Foreign Missionaries = \$103,419
- 4. Good Samaritan Benevolence = \$50,000
- 5. Church Planters Fund = \$1,082,912
- 6. Bethany School of Ministry = \$938,814

CHURCH MINISTRIES FUND GIVING

In 2010 256 churches contributed to the CMF fund. This is 59% of our churches. The total received was \$517,480, which is \$27,442 lower than 2009.

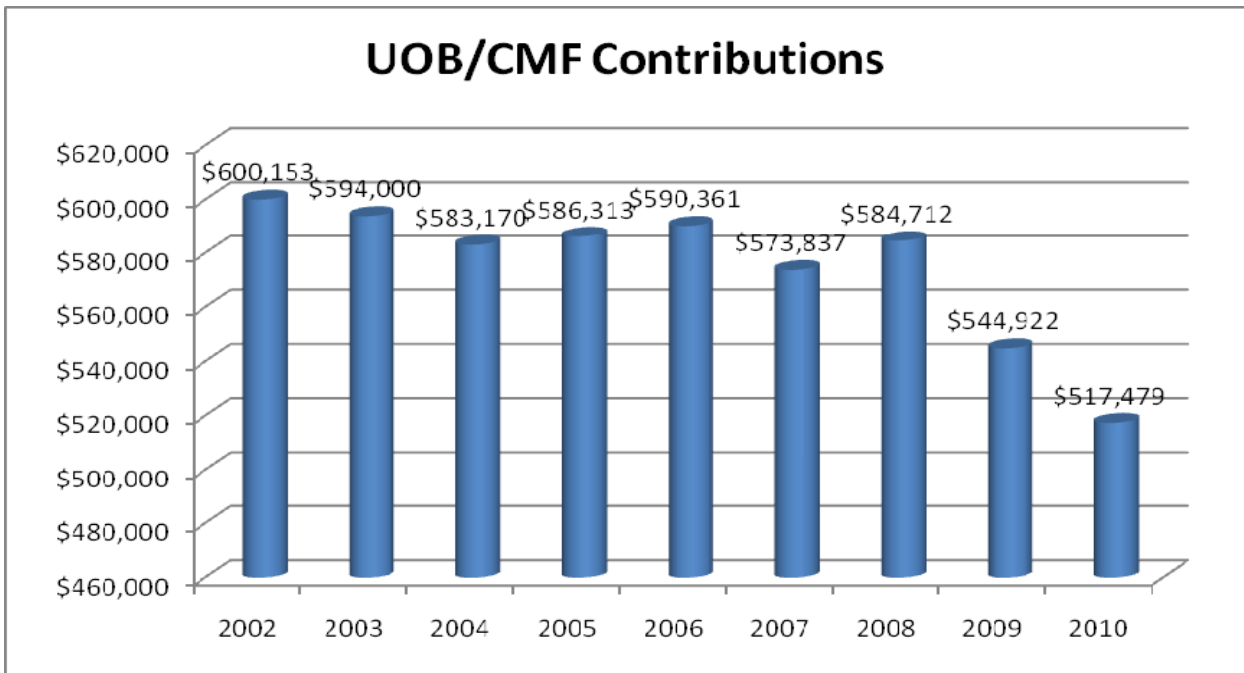
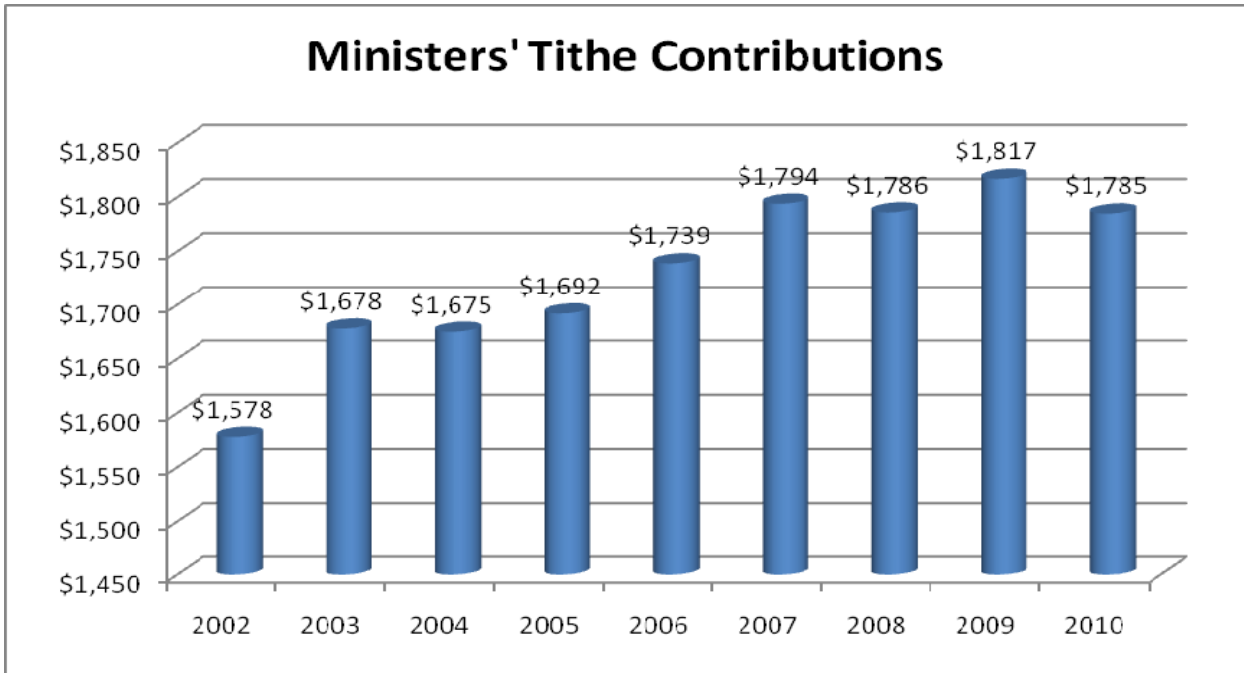

MINISTERS' CONTRIBUTIONS

Ministers' tithe contributions totaled \$1,785,330. This is down \$31,680 (1.7%) from 2009.

Additional funds were given by ministers:

- \$39,960 for Pastoral Care & Leadership Development
- \$79,920 for Bethany University
- \$79,800 for home missions' pastors' health insurance
- \$199,800 for the DRC Mortgage

MINISTERS SUMMARY AND COMMENTS

We ended 2010 with 1,478 credentialed ministers, an increase of 30 over 2009. We issued 83 new credentials (that's 22 more than last year) and 33 upgrades.

Our number of female credentialed ministers is now 319, an increase of eight over 2009. At this time 21.5% of our credentialed ministers are female.

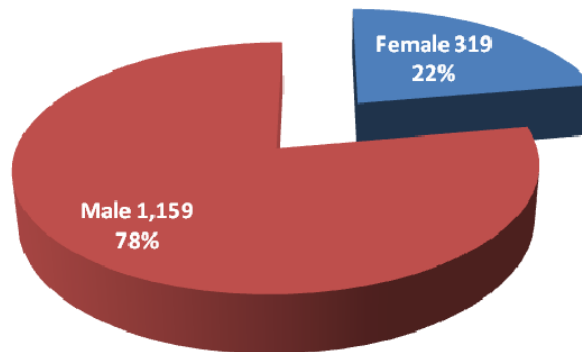

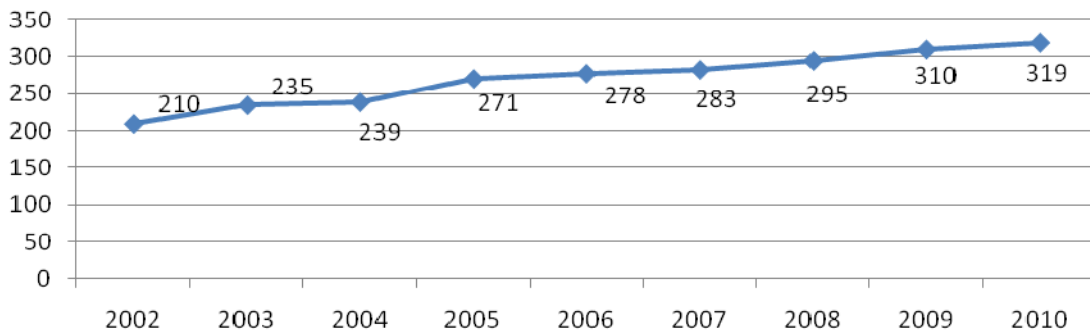

The median age of a new credential applicant in 2010 was 35. Thirty-three persons under age 30 were issued credentials. Twelve of these obtained their education through Berean, ten through Bethany, two each through AGTS, Epic College, and District Language Seminar, and one each from Vanguard, Northwest, School of Urban Missions, Champions, and Azusa Pacific.

MINISTERS LIFE INSURANCE

The Ministers Group Term Life Insurance Program is offered through the General Council. The program is written with The Standard Life Insurance Company. There were 926 ministers and spouses in our District insured as of December 31, 2010. The District Council provides the basic premium for this insurance coverage. In 2010 the basic premium cost of \$36,826.26 was paid by the District.

During 2010, 13 ministers covered by the Ministers Group Life Insurance passed away. The total amount paid to their beneficiaries was \$29,000.

MINISTERS BENEVOLENCE FUND

The Minister's Benevolence Fund is a voluntary death benefit program for our ministers (not to be confused with the Good Samaritan Benevolence Fund which assists ministers in financial crisis). This program has been losing money for several years. Recently, the Presbytery considered closing down this program. It was decided, instead, to ask participants to voluntarily waive their benefit (and to continue making payments) and to ask non-participants to make donations to this ministry. The result has been moderately positive. At this point, the fund has stopped losing money. However, I predict that the problem will resurface—at some point we will have to decide to close down the program (or to invest a substantial amount of money into it). These decisions are complicated by the amount of years that some individuals have participated in the program, their financial need, and the fact that the program is prescribed in our District Bylaws.

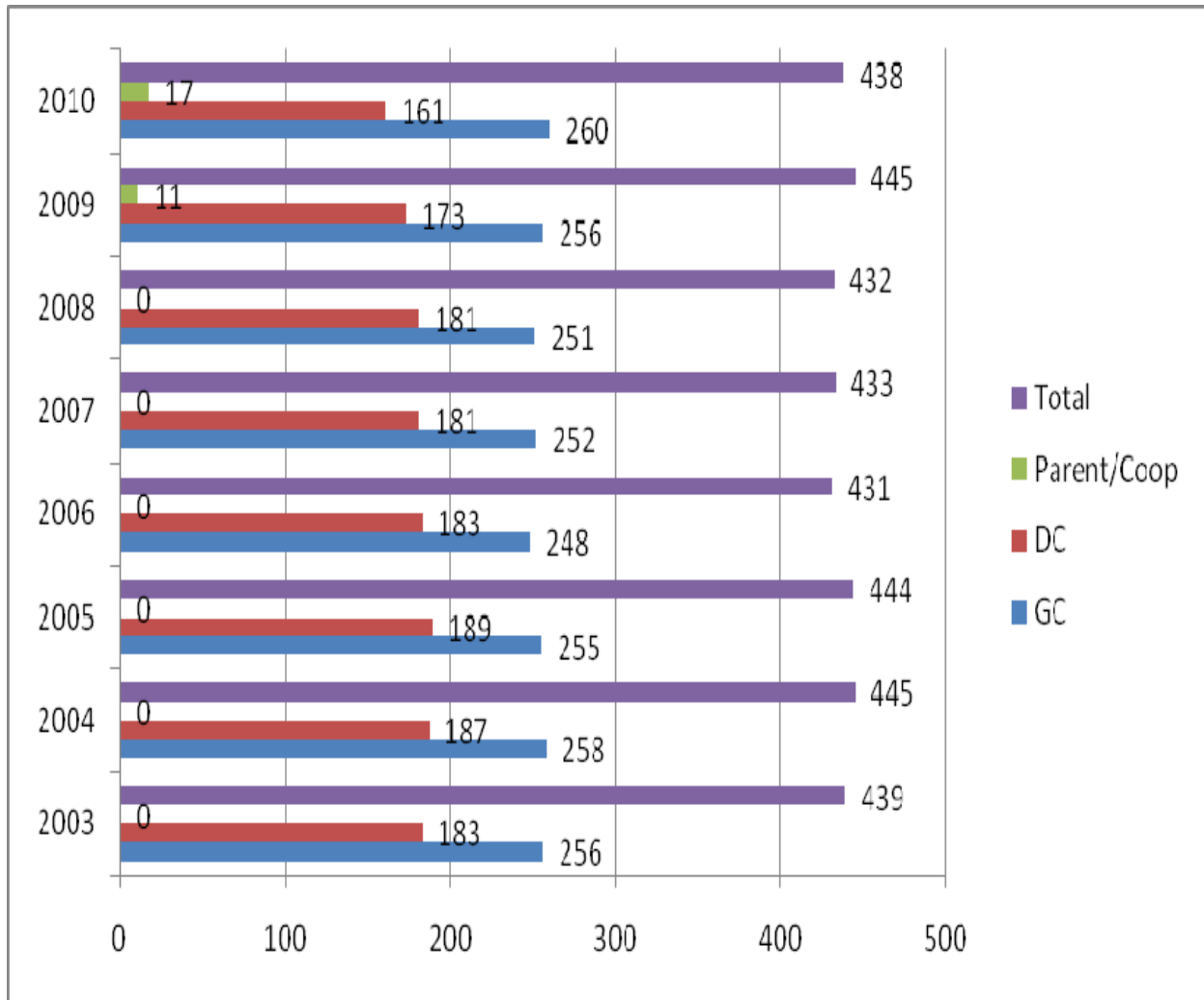

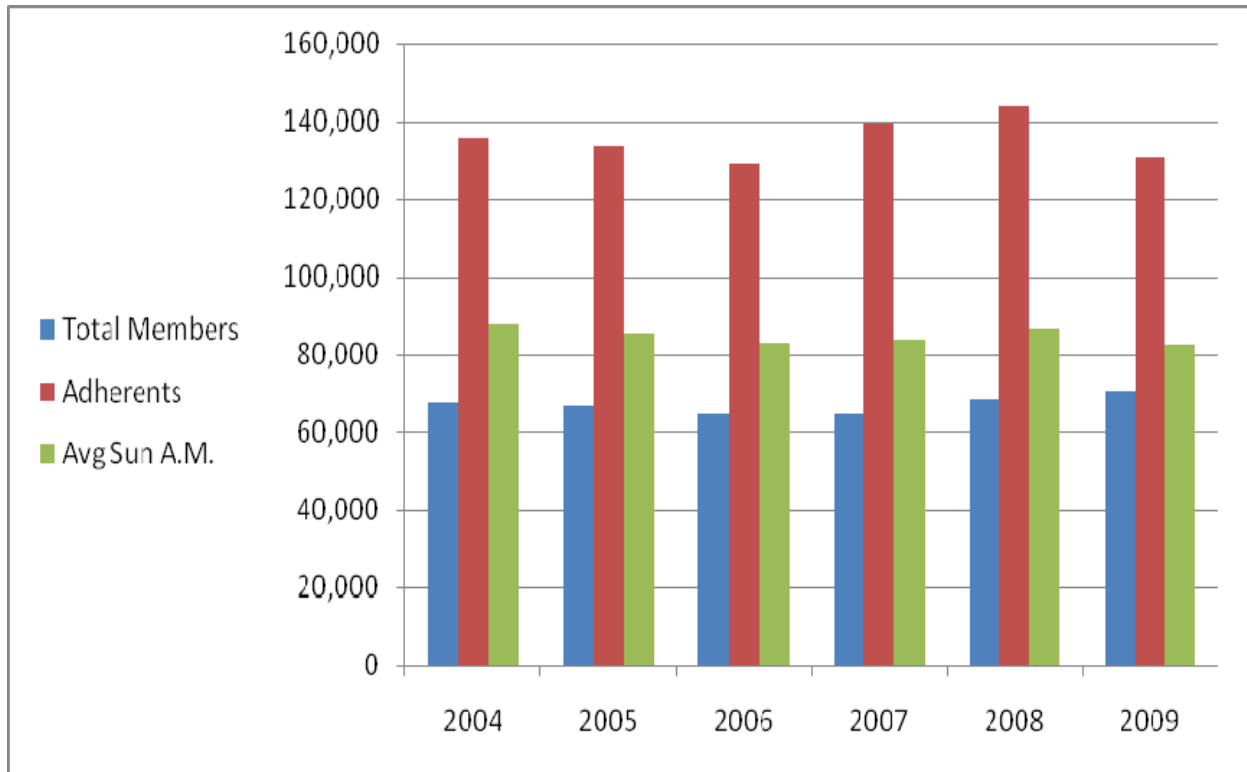
Number of Churches

June-August

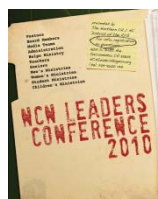

Leadership Development and Pastoral Care Report

Robert Douglas



Our resolve in 2010 was to concentrate on two central needs – health as a minister and health as a church. We embraced the Church Life Cohort model by Dr. Wayne and Sherry Lee in 2008 as the track to advance and grow healthy and vibrant churches within our District. We have seen this training process working well in 2010 as a total of 50 ministers (23 lead pastors/churches and 27 staff pastors) completed their two-year commitment to training. We saw the influence of Church Life materials expand as more pastors were becoming aware of the benefits it gives especially to the overall design of what a healthy church looks like. Part of that expansion was launching three new Cohorts. In the fall of 2009, we began a new DRC Cohort with seven lead pastors/churches, and in March 2010 two additional cohorts began in Northern Nevada (Elko), and Southern Nevada (Las Vegas), gathering twelve more lead pastors/churches.

By launching these new Cohorts we split our training time into two sessions – one that concentrated on the pastor’s personal growth (Healthy Pastor) and the other that concentrated on church advancement (Healthy Church). We believe that adding the “Healthy Pastor” component to our Cohorts is the key to lasting change.

In 2010, we modified the format of our Cohorts to encompass a one-day training which would serve our first year pastors and second year pastors on different days. The benefit of this format allowed

our second year participants to come on the second day of training as a refresher course, if they desired. Several of our pastors took that option. It served as a great tool to reinforce the foundational points of implementing the 15 vital functions of church life.

We also added an optional lab-type of training for our DRC Cohorts that we held for three hours one day a month in between our regular training times. This proved to be a great time of discussion among our pastors and very practical as they shared how the principles of Church Life were being implemented in their individual churches. And we received a great response to our Northern and Southern Nevada Cohort training sessions.

During this past year we saw an increase in ministry needs which at times seems to overwhelm our human ability to handle it all. Without the compassionate care and guidance of the Holy Spirit we would not have had the needed direction required to assist our pastors and churches in this vast District. We were able to successfully provide counseling support with licensed therapists for many hurting pastors needing a safe place. We want to encourage our pastors to call this office if they are in need so we can adequately support them. I am actively engaged in mentoring, counseling, and training men and women who serve our churches and those who serve our pastors (lay leaders/board members). We visited many of our sections and churches throughout the year letting them know of our commitment to serve the pastors through hands-on personal support, teaching, training, and coaching. We are committed to fashioning all that we do to focus on practical tools that will aid our ministers and be proactive in assisting them with issues and challenges that come with pastoral ministry regardless of size or church culture.

We have continued in our partnership with Pathway Apprenticeship. It has been a joy to share with our younger ministers and I am committed to

investing in the lives of those just beginning their journey. I know God will use it all for His redemptive purposes in their lives.

Our department continues to oversee the 'Care Group Ministry' for pastor's wives. Teri Herndon launched this ministry a few years ago and is continuing to offer a monthly meeting for pastor's wives to share and learn from one another. My wife, Fanita, has been able to participate and we hope to continue to expand this ministry. We know it is an especially needed point of caring as many of our pastor's wives live under burdens no other person can understand except another pastor's wife.

2010 was an amazing year with great victories for NCN Student Ministries. While the majority of this report focuses on the various events we hosted this last year, we were truly blessed by the individual and group connections made with pastors and leaders throughout our District. These connections bring a new excitement and have introduced a strong sense of unity and rich fellowship and love for one another and a willingness to serve one another. More important than events or activities, the leaders of our Student Ministries are growing! The combination of unity, excitement and growth in our Student Ministry Leaders will result in our vision becoming a reality.

STATEMENT OF VISION: To see the development of a healthy, growing youth and college ministry in each of our churches in Northern California & Nevada, by partnering with NCN Student Ministries.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE:

MODELING: *Teamwork – unity, helping others succeed.

*Giving

*Excellence – zeal, passion, growth

MENTORING:*Leadership – combining both spiritual and practical aspects of leadership

*Personal integrity

Pathway: Pathway continues to serve the churches in our District with excellence. This past year has been marked by exponential growth not only numerically, but in the lives each of our Pathway Apprentices. In 2010, Pathway successfully launched eight apprentices and saw 10% of the total youth convention attendance come from those churches that we

have partnered with. Pathway also saw 500 children actively participate in our Harvest outreaches in October of this year that had no prior outreach to children in the past. In August of this year, we began a transition of leadership as Rev. Andrew Huson moved into a Senior Pastor position at River City Community Church in Sacramento and Rev. Jeremy Morgado accepted the roll as our new Pathway Director. Pathway Media launched with the focus to develop and create videos, websites, and graphics for those churches who desire to take advantage of today's technology yet do not have the resources available to do so themselves.

Leadership Congress: We hosted our 13th annual Student Ministries Leadership Congress January 28-30, 2010. It was our desire to target authentic relationships as we all sought leadership development. During these three days, we were able to host over 300 leaders from our District in Emeryville. Our general sessions included the ministry of Dr. Tim Elmore, President of Growing Leaders; Dan Kimball, Pastor of Vintage Faith in Santa Cruz; Jeffery Portmann, Northwest District Youth Director; Glen Packiam of the Desperation Band for a special night of worship, and our own Superintendent, James Braddy. It was a great weekend of leadership development and connecting.

Student Leader Conference: Our 3rd Annual Student Leadership Conference was on March 20, 2010 at Harvest Church in Elk Grove. We were able to strategically resource our pastors by investing in nearly 200 key student leaders. I personally was able to speak in a general session and was honored to welcome back our former District and National Youth Director, Eddie Rentz to speak in our last general session. Our altars were filled between both sessions with students making commitments to "set the example" according to 1 Timothy! Dr. Jay Herndon was able to connect with 20 students who felt called to full-time ministry, laying a foundation for them as they begin their journey.

FAF: We hosted nearly 400 students from both Northern California and Nevada during our Fine Arts Festival (FAF). We remain committed to equip and develop the gifts and talents God has given the stu-

dents of our District. Due to the growth of FAF and the desire to strategically resource Nevada, we launched a FAF in Southern Nevada hosted at Champions Center in Las Vegas. This year, we were able to partner with Bethany University in a greater fashion. We awarded over \$100,000 in scholarships to some of our top students. 2010 was a great foundation for us to build upon for the future.

District Council: Tuesday night of District Council served as our Student Ministries emphasis night. Over 500 students joined with pastors and leaders from our District



to worship and be encouraged to pursue their call in ministry. We were blessed by "Worth Dying For," a touring worship team from Calvary Temple Worship Center in Modesto, as they led us in worship. One of the

greatest ministry honors I've received was to preach that night on "Answering the Call to Reach the Next Generation!" Many students were called into ministry that night and countless pastors were encouraged in their pursuit of reaching the next generation.

Camps: Our first camp was hosted at Jenness Park outside of Sonora, CA at the end of June. This was our second year returning to their amazing facility and has proven to be a great camp. This year, we partnered with Rev. Joey Steelman from Lakeview Assembly in Stockton, CA. Joey preached with great passion as he ministered to our students and pastors. Our altars were filled with many baptized in the Holy Spirit and called to ministry.

July continued with the remainder of our summer camps. On July 5, we began our annual Whitewater Leadership camp near the Oregon border. This year, we had over 150 students and leaders that were able to bring clarity and definition to their personal "call." This was our largest attendance in our nine year history and continues to be a highlight. I was honored to speak at this camp with various youth pastors speaking during our morning devotions.

Our third summer camp was hosted at William Jessup University for both Junior High and High School students. We were privileged to welcome back for a second year, the NPLAD Youth Director, Ramiro "Chubs" Quiroz. We saw significant impact with the 130 students in attendance. During this camp, we were able to partner with students

from our Fine Arts Festival. We targeted the students who received a "Superior with Invitation Award" during the Festival in April to travel on a one week ministry tour. These students were a part of our camp and ministered in five churches and youth services impacting over 750 people. It was a great opportunity for these twelve students who traveled with our team; four of them feeling that God called them into full-time ministry.

Our team was forced to be creative for our final camp of the summer due to the construction beginning on the Bethany Campus. As a result, we shifted from a traditional camp to a Summer Conference and hosted our final week at the Marriott Hotel in Santa Clara. The week was an action packed event that included a day at the theme park, Great America and freedom in the schedule for pastors to choose their own adventure based on their students. Instead of hosting one speaker for the entire week, we hosted three speakers: Rev. Ramiro "Chubs" Quiroz, Rev. Eddie Rentz and Rev. Bret Allen. Each speaker did an amazing job and helped us conclude our camp season with a great impact!

STL Leadership Excursion:

In October of this year, we were privileged to partner again with Global Passion to host our fifth annual Speed the Light (STL) Leadership Excursion. This year, seven Pastors and Leaders joined



me on our trip to Haiti in which we were able to present a STL vehicle to Missionary Dan Henslee and Convoy of Hope. While there we saw not only the aftermath of the Haitian earthquake but our missionaries in action. They are modern day heroes!

Convention: November was truly a highlight of the year filled with excitement, anxiety and great momentum. We had over 2,300 students and leaders from our District gather together in the city of Sacramento, to celebrate the victories of 2010. Capital Christian Center was again gracious enough to host us and it proved to be our greatest asset. Students entered the CCC Sanctuary with the attitude of Worship as opposed to the mindset of entertainment.

Our first service began with Evangelist Allen Griffin, from Orlando, FL, who ministered with excellence! His message of hope and a challenge for the lost proved to be a powerful beginning to an amazing weekend. I had the privilege of speaking during our second service and focused on the call to ministry and missions. At the conclusion of this service approximately 1,100 students responded to the altar for a full-time call to Pastoral Ministry and Missions. Prior to the message, we were able to host seven missionary families on our stage that helped us with a "live" interview on how STL has blessed both

them and their ministries. Through these efforts and the faithfulness of our youth pastors, we were able to collect nearly \$6,000 in offering for our STL missionaries. It was a great victory!

During our final service, we were able to host one of our local Pastors, Joey Steelman of Lakeview Assembly of God in Stockton. Pastor Steelman shared his personal testimony of his life transformation which proved to be a great way to conclude the weekend. Our altar was packed again with well over 1,000 students.

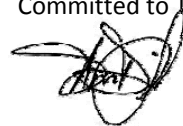

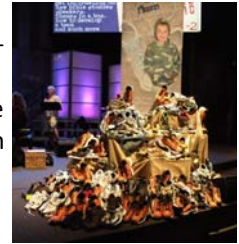
WM Day at District Council
